The Mount St. Helens Institute is dedicated to helping people of all ages gain an understanding of the natural processes and cultural heritage of the Pacific Northwest's volcanic landscapes. They offer a wide range of programs from Volcano Outdoor School to expert-led guided hikes and climbs on America's youngest and most active volcano.

to the 2015 WA Tech Trek camp, who will tell us about their camp experience.









I thought the map that AAUW created to show the status of wage discrimination in the United States was very informative. 2015 showed progress in the earnings equity arena, but we certainly aren't there yet in terms of pay equity for women across the nation and we can note that *nowhere* in the U.S. is there 100% equity.

Governors in Connecticut, Delaware, North Dakota and Oregon signed into law measures aimed at narrowing the gender wage gap. These new laws make it harder for employers to: use non-work-related defenses to defeat pay discrimination claims (North Dakota); prohibit employers from discriminating or retaliating against employees who discuss their wages (Connecticut, Oregon) or who are involved in proceedings to fix pay discrimination (Oregon); increase remedies paid to victims of discrimination (Connecticut); and require contractors to pay all employees equally (Delaware). During the 2015 session, at least 21 other states proposed equal pay bills that were ultimately defeated. Of those attempts, Kentucky, Louisiana, Nevada, and Washington succeeded in getting equal pay bills through their first chamber, which is a good sign for action in the next legislative session. It amazes and saddens me that this is even a topic in the twenty-first century, but reminds me to support AAUW's efforts to end this discrimination.


CFP's approach for building friendships, trust and respect in Cyprus involves pairing teenagers from north and south Cyprus, aged 15-17, who form relationships across the partition on the island, meeting each other's families and friends and engaging in trust and team-building activities. Then for four weeks in July, the teens are hosted by U.S. families and participate in their daily lives. They also attend group activities focused on conflict resolution, team building and environmental awareness. "There are moments in history when everything is working for you. The 1990s landmark AAUW research study, Short Changing Girls, Short Changing America was conducted showing girls are subtly discouraged in math and science classes in middle and high school.

While girls and boys entered school roughly equal in



measured ability, by age fifteen girls had poor selfimages and constrained views of their futures. This eye-opening study served as a wake-up call, exposing the systematic bias that girls face in education.

AAUW Helps Fight Campus Sexual Assaults

The chance of a woman being sexually assaulted during college is about the same as her chance of catching the flu during an average year. The problem is she can't just take aspirin and



rest to recover. Sexual assault has devastating, lasting effects on students. Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 prohibits the sexual harassment of college and university students. Sexual assault, an extreme form of sexual harassment, "denies or limits, on the basis of sex, a student's ability to participate in or receive benefits, services, or opportunities at the institution." When it affects the survivor's educational opportunities, sexual assault creates what the legal system identifies as a hostile environment and needs to be dealt with on the federal level.

AAUW Vice President of Government Relations Lisa Maatz testified before a U.S. Congressional hearing on September 10, 2015 saying that our campuses are in crisis. AAUW is fighting to eliminate the problem.


