








### Lunch Posse: Goes to C'est La Vie on May 26 at 1:30

# What happens at Tech Trek... ...doesn't stay at Tech Trek!

### The Columbian

A letter to *The Columbian* from Kathi Pickett, Hudson's Bay Branch AAUW April 12 represented the day we "celebrate" when a woman's earnings catch up to

what a white male made in 2015. The average woman working full time in the U.S. has to work 15 months to earn what a male did in just 12. The pay gap is even worse for women of color and mothers.

Women face an average earnings ratio of 77 cents, which means less money for feeding families, paying off student loans and saving for retirement. Without legislative remedies for pay equity, it could be more than 100 years before we achieve equal pay. If Congress won't act, the states must.

Existing Washington law is weak when it comes to equal pay. We need legislators to listen to their constituents and pass some real solutions that will help real Washington women achieve full economic equality.

Passing a federal law like the Paycheck Fairness Act would help protect everyone in all states. Meanwhile, Washington American Association of University Women members, including myself, continue to urge the Legislature to make improvements to Washington's equal pay laws. Please join us and tell state representatives to join the countrywide movement and ensure equal pay for every Washingtonian.

# First Mothers: Portraits of Progress Includes THREE AAUW Leaders



Artist Hilarie Couture has painted 36 portraits of influential women of Clark County. The project, entitled First Mothers: Portraits of Progress, will be exhibited in five local venues between now and January 2017.

Hilarie Couture, artist

Current member, past president, and Named Gift Honoree in 2005, **Donna Roberge Nozel**, is the subject of one of the paintings. Her biography, connected to the project, reads: Chair of Clark County Arts Commission and arts commissioner for the City of Camas. Community positions include serving as a Camas-Washougal port commissioner.

Honored posthumously is former AAUW member **Val Ogden**. Her biography states: The county's First Citizen in 2006; executive director of YWCA Clark County; state representative from 1991-2003; worked with Camp Fire; Council for the Homeless; on Human Services Council. Val Ogden was our AAUW Named Gift Honoree in 2002.

Another former member of our branch honored posthumously is **Dorothy Langsdorf**. She devoted 30 years to the Discovery Trail system, was founding president of the Fort Vancouver Regional Library Foundation and a 1999 Woman of Achievement. Dorothy was an AAUW Vancouver Named Gift Honoree in 1982 for her work on the Dual Telephone Listing project.

- September through December: Clark County Historical Museum, 1511 Main St.





# Senator Murray's new bill would encourage and support women and minorities in STEM fields

The small numbers of women and minorities going into high-paying science and tech fields has long been a concern among educators and policymakers. A new bill co-sponsored by U.S. Sen. Patty Murray would authorize grants for outreach, mentoring and professional development programs that encourage women and minorities to enter STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) fields.

The legislation would also fund STEM education outreach programs in K-12 schools. In all, the program would provide \$15 million a year between 2017 and 2021 for the programs. The programs would be chosen, and the funds would be administered, by the National Science Foundation.

Women make up only 26 percent of STEM workers, according to a 2013 American Community Survey report on disparities in STEM employment. Other studies have shown that women are more likely than men to switch out of STEM majors, and about half of women working in STEM fields quit their jobs after 10 years.

It's also been difficult for minorities to get a toehold in STEM fields. The Higher Education Research Institute at the University of California, Los Angeles, has found that only 22 percent of Latino students, 18.4 percent of African-American students and 18.8 percent of Native American students studying in STEM fields complete their degrees within five years. By comparison, 33 percent of white students, and 42 percent of Asian students, complete their degrees in that time period.


