

FYI: The decision regarding the Port of Vancouver becoming the site of a large oil terminal may be made early in 2018. Two events are taking place that should dictate the future of the oil terminal. The first is the November election with two candidates running for the District 1 Port Commissioner. The colorful gentlemen running are Orange and Green. One is opposed and one is in favor. If the new Commission votes no, it is over. If it votes to continue the process, the second event will be Governor Jay Inslee's decision based upon the recommendation of the Energy Facility Site Evaluation Council which is due November 30, 2017.

FYI: Did you know that you can become a "Two-Minute Activist?" AAUW makes it easy for you to support public policy issues that are consistent with AAUW objectives and values. First, go to www.aauw.org, choose "What We Do," choose "Public Policy," choose "Two-Minute Activist," and make a choice or choices that you want to promote with your congressional delegation. Guaranteed to make you feel like you are a participant in making positive changes.

FYI: On October 24, 2017, the Washington State Supreme Court will hear oral arguments regarding the Washington State budget which provides for the 2017-18 and 2018-2019 school years. The question is whether or not the budget provides adequate funds for basic education as required by the McCleary Decision. Vancouver Public Schools Superintendent Steve Webb says. "No." Stay tuned for an update next month.

FYI: Meaningful Movies presents OVARIAN PSYCOS, Women Find Strength in Numbers, on October 12 at 5:30 at the Cascade Park Library, 600 NE 136th Ave, Vancouver. Ovarian Psycos is about a new generation of fierce, unapologetic and feminist women of color from the Eastside of Los Angeles who confront injustice, build community, and redefine identity through a raucous, irreverently named bicycle crew: The Ovarian Psycos Cycle Brigade.





When you consider how much time to devote to our scholarship fundraising efforts over the next two months, please think about the significant role an offer of strings-free, financial aid can mean to a woman in college.


Your efforts to solicit gift cards, gift certificates, and goods from local merchants and artisans are what make our raffle and silent auction at the December Holiday Brunch a success. Don't be shy about asking a business owner to contribute. This truly is a good cause that you can represent proudly and the donor will get 8 months of free advertising in our newsletter.

Our branch has budgeted to increase scholarship funding by \$1000 this year; offering a second \$1000 scholarship to a woman at Clark College. That brings our total to \$7000 in financial aid for college women in Clark County, including two \$2500 scholarships to WSU Vancouver and two \$1000 scholarships for Clark College.

If you need to be convinced that this kind of help is desperately needed, please take time to read some excerpts from an AAUW study (below) or go to AAUW National's website (www.aauw.org) to read their entire findings. Let's make sure that at least four women in Clark County get the same chance at higher education that we all got!

Right now about 44 million borrowers in the United States hold about \$1.3 trillion in outstanding student loans. The scale of outstanding student loans and an increasing share of borrowers who fail to repay have made many Ameri-

cans aware that student debt is a challenge for society and for individual borrowers. Yet despite the fact that women represented 56 percent of those enrolled in American colleges and universities in fall 2016, many people do not think of student debt as a women's issue. This report reveals that women also take on larger student loans than do men. And because of the gender pay gap, they have less disposable income with which to repay their loans after graduation, requiring more time to pay back their student debt than do men. As a result, women hold nearly two-thirds of the outstanding student debt in the United States — more than \$800 billion.

Once rarities who received a small fraction of college degrees when AAUW was founded in 1881, women now earn 57 percent of bachelor's degrees from American colleges and universities. Large increases in the representation of racial and ethnic minorities in college enrollment have also occurred; between 1976 and 2014 the portion of enrolled college students who were not white more than doubled from 16 percent to 42 percent. However, this increased diversity within colleges and universities has occurred alongside the increased price of attendance. Though median household incomes in the United States have barely budged since 1976, the median price of college attendance has more than doubled. The gap between household incomes and the price of attendance is filled by student loans, which are readily available to almost all college students but also difficult to discharge in bankruptcy, meaning they are risky investments for some students who rely on them to attend college.

For the past five years, the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program has provided nearly 800,000 recipients the ability to attend school, go to work, and contribute to our economy without fear of deportation.
