AAUW’s September 10 general meeting will be held in **our new meeting place**: the community room at 101 Main Street in Vancouver, starting at 10 a.m. Our first program for the new year will be a look at the Vancouver Waterfront Development Project, presented by the project manager, Teresa Brum. An economic development expert with more than 20 years of experience, Teresa Brum joined Vancouver’s Community and Economic Development Department on Jan. 27, 2016. She has a Master of Arts degree in urban planning and public administration.

Brum serves on the executive board of the Washington Economic Development Association, is a frequent conference speaker, and teaches graduate level classes at the Eastern Washington University School of Business and Public Administration.

Vancouver’s Waterfront development project will reconnect 35 acres along the Colum-

bia River to the city’s historic core. The Waterfront is envisioned as a destination where urban vitality, livability and natural beauty come together on the Columbia River and ultimately transform downtown Vancouver.

The project has been realized, thus far, through the collaborative public-private partnership of the developer and the City, as well as the substantial support of numerous agencies and individuals. The overall redevelopment project is the largest economic development project in Vancouver’s history.

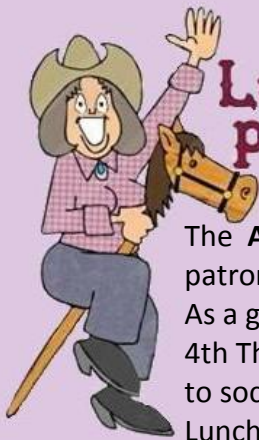

AAUW does not endorse political candidates, but those words, in The Columbian, about a cross section of candidates are enough to warm the heart of any AAUW member. Let's hear it for better educated and more diverse candidates from which to choose !! Taken from the news article: "The Clark County council is on the brink of becoming better educated, younger and more diverse. Neither of the outgoing Clark County councilors, Republicans David Madore or Tom Mielke, earned a college degree. But all four candidates vying for their seats did. In District 3, Republican John Blom holds a master's in history from Ohio University, and Democrat Tanisha Harris earned a bachelor's in social science from Washington State University. In District 4, Republican Eileen Quiring obtained a bachelor's in human resources management from George Fox University, and Democrat Roman Battan earned a bachelor's in business administration at WSU. The candidates are also, in general, younger. At 68, Quiring is the oldest of the four, but Blom, 32, Harris, 40, and Battan, 35, would be the youngest councilors on the board. And Harris, a black woman who in 2001 received the YWCA Val Joshua Racial Justice Award, could be the first person of color on the Clark County council." I am happy for all of us local voters! Ed

Your \$75... Where Does it Go?

Our President Kathy Walker asked me to write an article regarding our dues. Specifically, where does the money go? Simplistically, the answer is \$49 to National, \$10 to State, and \$19 to Vancouver Branch. But that is only the beginning of the story.

How much money are we talking about?

National	170,000 members at \$49	\$8,330,000
State	2800 members at \$10	\$ 28,000
Local	86 members at \$16	\$ 1,376

National: \$8,330,000. That is a lot, but in order to run a charity, which AAUW is with a Charity Navigator rating of 4 of 5 stars, it takes money. It takes space, technology, leadership and staff. National AAUW has all of this. Fourteen staff members and a Board of Directors play THE WOMAN CARD every day. And they are not looking for votes. They are working for equality and opportunity for girls and women. I encourage all of you to spend some time on the National website. You will find that donations and dues, your \$49 included, are doing great things.

State of Washington: \$28,000. Washington State is doing a lot with very little. It publishes the Evergreen Leader, holds the State Convention, lobbies the Washington State Legislature, maintains a website, updates needed software, and provides two Tech Trek Camps. Except lobbyist who is paid \$900 per year, all the work is done by officers and volunteers. Occasionally funds are used to ensure leaders across the state are able to attend conventions and conferences. No funds are used for office space or telephones.

Vancouver Branch: \$1376. We also do a lot with very little. We use our funds to recruit new members, facilitate monthly meetings, publish a Membership Directory, provide a website, publish a monthly newsletter, and hold an annual holiday fundraiser. Our fundraiser and donations allow us to send two or three girls to Tech Trek, hold a STEM Recognition Reception, and provide scholarships to WSU and Clark College. Our local officers frequently dip into their own pockets to accomplish our objectives.

Personally, I am pleased that my \$75 is being used so well. Beverly Olson

Vancouver AAUW 2016—2017 Budget

The AAUW Vancouver executive board approved the budget for 2016 –2017 at a meeting on Aug 10 at the home of Carol Brain, VP Finance.

If our fundraising activities for this year are successful, our branch will give a \$1000 scholarship to a female student at Clark College and contribute \$1500 to our scholarship fund at The Community Foundation for Southwest Washington, with instructions to send from that fund two \$2500 to female students at WSU-Vancouver.

The foundations at both colleges have our criteria for scholarships and choose the recipients based on those. The board of directors reviewed the criteria for our branch’s scholarships last year and the membership voted on those they wanted to continue to use.

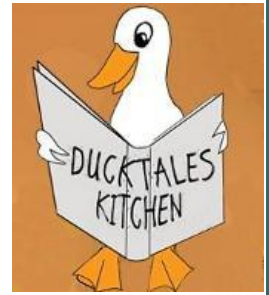

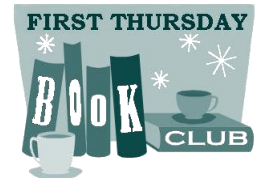

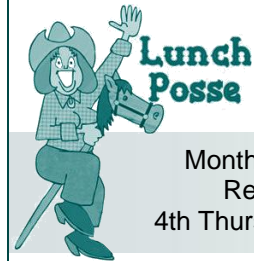
