AAUW's October 8 general meeting will begin at 10 a.m. in the community room at 101 Main Street in Vancouver. Our October program will highlight girls in Middle School involved in STEM activities. Our speakers will be four girls from Pacific Middle School who won a NASA competition last year and the three campers that our branch sent to WA Tech Trek Camp last July.

Over the past 50 years, women in the U.S. have made great strides in education and entry into the work force. Despite these advances, however, women continue to be underrepresented in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and math. AAUW is working to encourage girls in middle school and high school to take a good look at STEM subjects with the hope that they will engage in these fields down the road.

In regard to STEM, middle school is a particularly important time, with many students beginning to consider possible career options. The opinions girls have about STEM subjects at this age will carry through to the future, with experiences or perceptions dramatically impacting their choices. Add the fact that success in math and science are largely considered geeky at this age, and a perception that scientists are strange, whitecoated individuals working laboriously on some wacky or irrelevant study, means that few middle school kids seriously consider STEM occupations. This can be changed.

September 12, 40 AAUW leaders from the Portland Metro area gathered to hear Lisa Maatz, National AAUW's VP Government Relations speak

On September 12, I had the pleasure of joining other AAUW Metropolitan Portland IBC members at a dinner at McMenamin's Kennedy School to hear Lisa Maatz speak. Ms. Maatz is AAUW National's Vice President Government Relations and has been with AAUW in Washington, D.C. since 2003. As AAUW's top policy adviser, she works to advance AAUW's priority issues on Capitol Hill, in the White House, and in coalition with other organizations.

Among other topics, Ms. Maatz spoke about today's Congress not being able to legislate. As an example, she pointed to the recent bill for emergency funding that public health experts say is desperately needed to fund the CDC's fight against the Zika virus. Because provisions were added to the bill that were related to Planned Parenthood, it did not pass. She deplored the lack of bipartisan cooperation that is needed to represent all our interests. She spoke of the need for Family Leave legislation and asked us to push our congressmen and women to co-author bills related women's rights.

One of the things she touched on that resonated with me, was that AAUW is listened to and respected on Capitol Hill because we have one of the largest, and best organized, grassroots organizations in the United States. Kathy




