Carolyn Long, Assoc. Prof. WSU Vancouver

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Our speaker for May is Carolyn Long, an Associate Professor in the School of Politics, Philosophy and Public Affairs at Washington State University Vancouver.

In 2014, Long launched the Initiative for Public Deliberation, a student-led program aimed at strengthening democratic government by replacing rigid partisanship with listening and conversation. IPD serves as an impartial resource for the Southwest Washington community to assist in community problem-solving. Long received her B.A. with majors in Political Science and Rhetoric and Communication from the University of Oregon in 1989 and her Ph.D. in Political Science from Rutgers University in 1997. Her research interests focus on American Institutions, Public Law, American Public Policy and Public Civility and Public Discourse. She is the author of two books, Religious Freedom and Indian Rights: The Case of Oregon v. Smith and Mapp v. Ohio: Guarding against Unreasonable Searches and Seizures.

She is currently working on a book on Newdow v. U.S. Congress: The Pledge and the Ninth Circuit for the University Press of Kansas. Carolyn was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Ljubljana School of Social Sciences in 2009-2010. She has taught courses on the American Constitution, Civil Liberties, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, The Judicial Process, Administrative Jurisprudence, Congressional Politics, Public Policy and American Institutions at WSUV since 1995. In 2017, Long was awarded the Iris H-RoC Award, which honors women in the community who have promoted civil discourse, teamwork, collaboration, and cooperation.

Long's past administrative experience includes service as the Interim Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs at WSU Vancouver, Associate Director of the College of Arts and Sciences, Associate Director of the College of Liberal Arts, and Director of the Program in Public Affairs.

University Responses to the College Admissions Scandal

STANFORD On March 21, Stanford president Marc Tessier-Lavigne and provost Persis Drell updated the Stanford community on developments surrounding the recent nationwide admissions fraud scheme, and explained steps the university is taking to ensure the integrity of Stanford's admissions process.

Among immediate changes is a new protocol requiring an executive member of the athletics department to verify the credentials of any student-athlete recruit prior to a coach's recommendation for admission. Stanford is launching external reviews into the processes followed for athletic recruit recommendations and the acceptance of gifts for athletic programs. With admissions letters for the Class of 2023 scheduled to go out at the end of the month, Tessier -Lavigne and Drell stated that the university has reviewed every applicant who was involved with athletic recruitment to make sure no one with falsified athletic credentials was admitted, and that they "have no evidence of any such person in this year's applicant pool."

USC said it fired senior associate athletic director Donna Heinel and water polo coach Jovan Vavic, who are both charged in the scheme. The school has also placed a faculty member on leave who was named in the indictment as a parent. The school plans to use any money received in connection with the alleged scheme to fund scholarships for underprivileged students, USC's interim President Wanda M. Austin said. Also, the university is conducting a review for enrolled students and USC will make informed, appropriate decisions after it's completed, university spokesman Gary Polakovic said.

UCLA is reviewing one currently enrolled student and one prospective student, both with possible ties to the college admissions investigation, according to Tod Tamberg, UCLA spokesman. "If UCLA discovers that any prospective, admitted or enrolled student has misrepresented any aspect of his/her application, or that information about the applicant has been withheld, UCLA may take a number of disciplinary actions, up to and including cancellation of admission," said Tamberg.

GEORGETOWN The university says it established a new policy in 2018 to strengthen the recruitment and admissions process, including audits of its athletics department "to determine whether any recruited students are not on the roster of the sport for which they were recruited. "An independent, third party is to conduct an audit of its athletic recruiting "to strengthen the integrity of our process," the school said.

YALE The school will conduct an investigation determine whether "others have been involved in activities that have corrupted the athletic recruitment and admissions process," President Peter Salovey said in a letter to the college community. Yale will use external advisers who will suggest changes that will help the college "detect and prevent efforts to defraud the admission process," he added. Officials are working to implement a code of conduct for athletic recruitment, he said. There will be no delay in the admissions decisions, Yale University spokesman Tom Conroy told CNN.

WAKE FOREST President Nathan Hatch said the university is reviewing admissions and athletics practices, but so far it appears Coach Ferguson acted independently and was the only person involved with the alleged misconduct. Hatch announced that the \$50,000 the school received would go to a scholarship program to support first-generation college students. He also said that the director of athletics and dean of admissions were directed to review the admission process. Wake Forest doesn't plan at this time to take action against the one currently enrolled student mentioned in the college admissions scandal indictment, a spokesperson said on March 20, adding that there is no evidence the student knew of the alleged financial transaction.

USD (University of San Diego) The school said it will work with an outside law firm to conduct an investigation and appoint a special committee to provide oversight into the university's response. "As with any students, falsifying or making misrepresentations on an application for admission can be grounds for disciplinary action under USD's Student Code of Rights and Responsibilities," the university president's letter stated.

Four Reasons for Optimism on the Pay Gap

AAUW CEO Kim Churches contributed an article on MBSNC's Know Your Value website about the role of salary transparency in advancing equity. Here's why she's feeling encouraged:

1. Secrecy policies are changing. Laws in 18 states and Washington, D.C., now ban employers from prohibiting salary discussions.

2. Workers are negotiating better. Websites like Salary.com are giving job candidates the data they need, and AAUW's free Work Smart online course provides tips for making the ask.

3. Employers are doing their part. More leaders are opting to share information about compensation decisions with employees — which is believed to narrow the pay gap. And companies like software and technology company SAP have made public commitments to pay equity.

4. People are talking. According to AAUW's poll, 57 percent of Americans reported they have or would discuss their pay with coworkers.
